



Sailboat Racing is a Bit Like Life, Give it Full Speed at the Start Line and Strive for Clear Air

COMMODORE'S CORNER

Sailors are a tenacious lot, some more so than others. The ocean makes up about 71% of the Earth's surface, and it is the biggest ecosystem of the planet, holding 99% of all habitable space in the world. While much of the surface of our oceans have been explored with the likes of Magellan, Drake, Scott and others, there are still many adventures to be had.

I am currently following Cole Brauer on Instagram, a 29-year-old woman (the only one in the race) from Long Island, who is competing in the Inaugural Global Solo Challenge 2023. It's a non-stop 26,000 NM race around the 3 great capes of Africa, South America, and Australia. It starts in the A Coruna, Spain, South to the Cape of Good, East to Tasmania, Cape Horn and back to A Coruna. The race started last September with starting days based on the handicap of the boats. First one to the finish wins. 16 boats started the race and 10 are still active. As of this writing, Ronnie Simpson in Shipyard Brewing de-masted February 11,600 miles from anywhere, and was rescued by a Taiwanese freighter with only minutes of daylight to spare and only hours from 50kt winds and 20-foot seas.

Cole, sailing First Light, is currently in 2nd place and projected to arrive March 5th, 128 days later. Check it out on www.Globalsolochallenge.com and follow the sailors on Instagram. Find out their positioning and go to Predictwind.com to see what the weather patterns are ahead of them. Cole is now sailing in 14kts of ESE wind making 9.0 kts at 17 deg True. It's a fun exercise to keep track of their progress. Give it a try. They'll be racing for the next few months.
